More than one thousand people were killed following disputed elections in Kenya at the end of 2007. Imam Muhammad Ashafa and Pastor Jame Wuye - former militia leaders turned peace-makers from Nigeria - were invited to mediate in the worst-affected district. This 39-minute documentary film depicts their dramatic bid to bring healing and reconciliation after death and destruction in Uasin Gichu in Rift Valley Province.



The film, a sequel to *The Imam and the Pastor*, shows that it is possible for the perpetrators of violence to become instigators of peace. It is a case study of grass-roots initiatives to rebuild communities torn apart by conflict.
